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3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, , The readings of the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A) invite us to fix our eyes firmly on Jesus alone and to shape our lives according to his call, without distraction, division, or calculation of personal gain.

The Gospel presents Jesus beginning his public ministry with a clear and demanding message: “Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.” His call to the first disciples is simple—“Follow me”—yet radical. They leave their nets, their livelihood, and their security, not because they know what they will gain, but because they recognize who is calling them. True discipleship begins when Jesus becomes the center, not a means to something else.

The first reading from Isaiah announces that those who walked in darkness have seen a great light. That light is not an idea or a rule, but a person—Christ himself. When we focus on him, our darkness of fear, self-interest, and division is dispelled. This is echoed in the second reading, where Saint Paul urges the community to overcome divisions and to belong not to personalities or factions, but to Christ alone. A Church focused on Jesus cannot remain divided, because unity flows naturally from a shared center.

Following Jesus also means adopting his way of love—doing good freely, without calculating rewards. The Gospel never promises comfort or recognition, but it does promise meaning. Saint Teresa of Calcutta reminds us: “Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love.” When our actions are rooted in love rather than return, they become reflections of Christ’s own self-giving.

Saint Francis of Assisi offers another powerful reminder: “What you are looking for is where you are looking.” If we focus on success, praise, or reward, that is what will shape us. But if we look to Jesus, our lives will be transformed into instruments of compassion, mercy, and light.

In a world that constantly asks, “What do I get in return?” today’s readings challenge us to live differently. To follow Jesus means trusting him enough to give generously, forgive freely, serve quietly, and love without conditions. When Jesus alone is our focus, our lives become a living proclamation that the Kingdom of God is truly at hand. Rev Mathew Biju
